	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Terrarium ferns going well, advice on how to keep moss alive! Suggested Seasol spray and keep out of the sun.</li> <li>• Native frangipani in Narrawallee has turned pale green does it need fertilizer. Suggested native fertilizer which may be bought at the Milton Country Store.</li> <li>• How to protect oranges from fruit fly, mould and borers. Fruit Fly traps work well, mesh exclusion bags may be bought online from Green Harvest. Check neighbours don't have rotting fruit. Prune wood infected by borers, keep trees healthy by watering and fertilizing. High humidity may cause mould, keep branches from over crowding allowing plenty of air circulation.</li> <li>• Lemon tree not fruiting, try hard pruning, citrus responds to a good cut back. Sulphate of potash to stimulate flowering.</li> </ul>
